Ignite your child's love of reading this Summer with Mr Brown's Summer Reading Tips



Hello Parents/Guardians,

I believe that reading outside of the classroom over the Summer is critical for maintaining and expanding children's skills over their extended break from formal learning. According to research, reading just 6 books with your child over the Summer can help to preserve learning from the preceding year. The Summer holidays also allow you the opportunity to spend quality time with your child while also strengthening his or her reading comprehension, vocabulary, thinking and communication skills. I wanted to share with you my top 7 tips for helping your child fall in love with reading. You might be pleased to discover you are doing many of these things already! And if you're not? They are easy to implement. Here goes:

1 Let your child see you reading for pleasure

Children learn more from what you *actually* do than what you *tell* them to do. Therefore, it's important that we model reading for pleasure for our children, whether it be a Classic Novel, a newspaper, or even a magazine.

2. Create pleasurable read aloud routines

This is probably the most important thing you can do to help your child create positive associations with reading! Keep in mind that reading doesn't need to just happen at bedtime. Consider reading aloud during dinner or bath time. Reading together not only shows children that reading is fun and valuable, but it also serves to strengthen your bond.

3. Keep a wide selection of books accessible in your home

Research shows that access to a variety of books is an important factor when it comes to keeping kids' minds sharp over the summer. You could also...

4. Try books with a CD to listen along to

These are great for times when you are really busy. The children love them because they are usually read by a famous actor. Or, if you've got an iPad or tablet try some of the many reading or phonics Apps available. But, there's no need to spend a fortune. Why not...

5. Visit a local Library

Our local libraries often hold a number of events for children over the Summer.

This will also provide an opportunity for you to...

6. Allow children to select the books they read

Children become more interested in reading when they are encouraged to select the books they read. Creating a bookshelf at an accessible level and encouraging him or her to pick their own stories is a great way to raise a reader for life.

7. Schedule "quiet reading time" each day

Teach children at an early age that looking at books quietly for a small period of time every day is part of their daily home routine. Not only is it great for their literacy development, but it will also save your sanity!



If you are looking to do some reading with your child over the Summer, we would like to recommend that you sign up for and use the Oxford Owls' website (www.oxfordowl.co.uk) which gives you online access to many of the Oxford Reading Tree books.

Whatever level of reading your child is at, whether your child enjoys looking at picture books or whether they are an independent reader looking for a challenge, the Oxford Owls' website has got over 250 great reads in their **free eBook library**. The website also includes plenty of useful information and advice for parents on how to help their children with reading, plus it is packed with plenty of fun activities and games for the children.

Rivers of the World

On 12th June 2019 Sarah Brown, a visiting artist, came into school to work with us for the 'Rivers of the World' art project. Pupils from 15US and 10US learnt about the rivers in **Africa** and how the rubbish is collected and recycled. We worked with this idea to make small paper mache balloons from brightly coloured paper. These will be strung together to make beautiful jewellery. Our work will be featured in an exhibition in The Hive in Worcester in November 2019.



BBC School Exchange Project

Upper school pupils were part of a filming project hosted by BBC Midlands Today they threw open its doors to our pupils giving them a window on the world at the BBC and an enhanced understanding of the news and a potentially life-changing introduction to the BBC and our services. The project was split into two parts;

The pupils visited BBC Birmingham for half a day, and got to experience a variety of activities including a guided tour behind the scenes of the Midlands Today studio and a workshop about Real/Fake News.
